Serving as the web awards Judge as been very enlightening. I got to see some truly wonderful web sites. However, I was very surprised as I got into the judging process to notice how many sites are lacking some key elements that I think every chapter web site should have. Meeting and contact information were the big omissions. Some included an email link, but that was it. Therefore, listed below are the judging criteria and what every web author should be aware of when they update their site.

Technical Correctness: While I didn't run a spell checker over the web pages, I did keep an eye out for glaring spelling and grammatical errors. I also noticed a lot of outdated links. About one-third of you are still pointing to Lesley's old cybertron address for the link to Region 2. You should be linking to http://www.region2.sfi.org/. While pointing to http://www.OmniFacets.com/region2/ is acceptable, if you point to the STARFLEET vanity URL now, you'll never have to change the link again should the location change since it redirects to the current domain.

Advanced Features: While not required to have them, your web site got more points if you offered something besides standard HTML. This could be as simple as frames, forms, or tables; or as complicated as java and javascript. Only the Blackstar used Java for anything grandiose. They did an excellent job with their online games. A few also used CGI for web based message boards. Of course, you don't have to write the code yourself in order to use it.

Compatibility: If you use advanced features, don't leave out those who aren't using them. I for one, prefer to run with those turned off due to poorly written code. Usually, if you scored high in Advanced Features, you usually scored lower in Compatibility unless you provided alternatives; and vice versa.

Multimedia Appeal: No one got more creative than animated GIFs. I was actually expecting to have to utilize a few browser plug-ins to view streaming media or audio files. But no one really utilized the multimedia aspect of the web. One site did use a MIDI background sound, but it was so large it caused points to be knocked off in the next category.

Efficiency: For the last time, JPGs are for scanned photographic images and GIFs are for line art. The size of the image doesn't automatically dictate one or the other; the contents do. ART files should not be used since they are a proprietary AOL format and may not be viewable by all browsers. BMP files are too large to be used on the web, so convert them to JPG or GIF first.

Additionally, use WIDTH and HEIGHT attributes in your IMG tags. That way, the text on the rest of the page can be viewed while your images download. In graphical buttons especially, use an ALT tag as well in case someone is blind or has graphics turned off. If you're using a WYSIWYG program such as FrontPage, check the image properties in order to change this. This may mean a little extra work when writing the web page, but the end result will be a better experience for web surfers.

Finally, provide actual, smaller thumbnails for picture galleries. Don't just use IMG attribute tags to resize a full-size image. You need to use a graphics program to actually create a smaller separate thumbnail size image of the original. There's nothing worse than waiting five minutes for a page of full-size, high resolution images to download. If we have thumbnails, surfers can click on just the images we're interested in seeing in detail.

In general, I get bored with a web page if I have to wait more than 15 seconds for it to download. That's probably a bit critical on my behalf, so I'd say no more than 30 seconds in general, certainly no longer than a minute. Those times are based on a throughput of 46K using a standard 56K modem. Anything longer and you should probably look for ways to improve the efficiency of your web page, perhaps by using better graphic compression. Since testing locally with your hard drive doesn't take much time, test your web site by visiting your actual URL instead in order to get a more accurate download time.

Design: This was a very subjective part of the criteria, so I almost

always gave higher marks across the board. However, I do suggest that you use several smaller pages instead of one big page, especially if you can contain the information into discrete logical units. For example, a main introductory page should tease the surfer with a bit of general information. Then link to several other pages that go into detail about your chapter's history, crewmembers, contact information, picture gallery, links, or whatever.

Content: As I mentioned earlier, I was shocked by the number of chapter web sites that provided very little useful information about their chapter. I personally think every chapter web site should include information on when and where they meet, as well as multiple ways to contact them. I could see some trepidation about putting directions to someone's home if that's where the chapter meets, but at the very least mention that it is held there and to contact you for directions. But if a chapter meets at a public place, there is very little reason not to include this information. Perhaps related to this was about half the web sites provided only e-mail contact. While that's fine, I would think a postal mailing address or phone number would be useful as well in case the surfer doesn't have a permanent internet connection.

Sites that provided a chapter history, newsletter, or picture gallery online scored higher in this criteria. Granted, I didn't read every newsletter article or view every picture, but I did at least go to the page and check some of the links. Occasionally, someone added a bit of humor to the site which made the visit much more enjoyable. Some even provided contact information and pictures of fellow crewmembers, which was also nice.

Overall: This was the general catch-all category for overall impression. The parts sometimes do not equal or surpass the whole. Granted, this was the most subjective of the criteria.

Vice-Chief Ranking: I asked my Vice-Chief, Steven Rosbury, to give me a listing of what he thought were the ten best web sites. He ranked them from first/best to last as follows: Blackstar, Trident, Guardian, Khai Tam, Draco, Triumph, Rogue Phoenix, Continuum, Chattahoochie Station, and Wernher von Braun.

Third Judge Ranking: This is the same as the Vice-Chief ranking, only I selected someone unaffiliated with Region 2 in order to add more impartiality to the result. Commander John Nelson aboard the USS Matrix chose these sites from first/best to last: Draco, Guardian, Khai Tam, Okatoma, Trident, Triumph, Rogue Phoenix, Continuum, Blackstar, and Hephaestus.

Their ranking gave additional points to the points I had assigned. I'd like to thank Steve and John for helping me with this! They weren't required to follow the same judging criteria that I used, though I did inform them of criteria that I used. Nor were they required to use all three browsers that I used. I greatly appreciate all their hard work.

Next year, I plan to add another category to the judging criteria: Freshness. While some of the web sites scored very well in the other

categories, they hadn't been updated since summer of 1999! Granted, for some things, fresh content isn't required. But for events calendars and other things, recent updates are a must, usually within the past month. I was particularly impressed when sites already had 2000 information online (since I judged in late January.) This time around, I considered Freshness in the Overall criteria. Freshness may replace the Overall or Third-Judge position next year.

Congratulations to the winners! Everyone should visit these web sites to get a better idea of what can be accomplished. And trust me, the Star Trek based Asteroids game hosted by the Blackstar is a marvelously addictive and fun Java game. I wasted several hours playing it.

Also, just because you didn't win at the regional level, that doesn't mean you can't win at the international level. Unlike the other Awards, the Fleet level Web awards are open to everyone, and not just the regional winners. All you have to do to be eligible is make sure you're linked either on the main Fleet web page (http://www.sfi.org/), the Operations chapter listing page (http://www.sfi.org/ops/), or on Region 2's chapter listing (http://www.region2.sfi.org/chapters.htm). While I'm fairly confidant my links are up to date, you should still verify that I and Operations have the correct URL listed. Then sit back and way for the international web awards to be announced at the annual International Conference.

In the coming month, I will e-mail each chapter their score. This will be done so the web masters can realize what areas they need to improve upon, and what areas they are doing good in. Additionally, I'll include a sentence or two to help further. A couple of chapters have already asked for a more in depth critique. While I am happy to do this, please be aware that I will be bluntly honest, though constructive. Also, it will be done at my convenience as time permits.

Finally, several people have been inquiring on how to get to the Region 2 IRC chats on the first Sunday of every month at 7 p.m. CST. Please visit the Cyberspace page (http://www.sfi.org/html/cyber.html) at the Fleet web site, or the web page of the Fleet IRC chat server (http://www.fleetchat.org/) for more in depth information. In general, you will need to download and install an IRC chat client (most popular is mIRC), connect to the Fleet chat server (irc.fleetchat.org on port #6667), and /join the R2 channel (#sfi-r2). You may want to try this in advance to see if you can even connect and join the regular Fleet channel

(#starfleet), which usually has several people in there.

REGION 2 SUMMIT 2000 by Pete Mohney

I arrived at the hotel Friday about noon. There were a few of people present already, so I started distributing some of the items I had brought to my hotel room, to the Starfleet Academy room, to registration, and to the Store. My wife, Sue Ellen Mohney, had suggested we allow pre-bidding and even pre-auction purchases this year, as we had seen this technique work so well at art shows at larger conventions. We also had a dealer, in the form of the screenprinting company that produced the Summit t-shirts, and the Region 2 Quartermaster had a table full of goods (mostly the brand-new Region 2 Polo shirts, in red with the new R2 logo on the chest).

I spent the afternoon setting up the store, dealing with small problems, and visiting with various R2 folks and guests from outside the region. At five p.m. we caravaned to the restaurant we had chosen for our dinner, and our first glitch showed up. The map that I had made had the wrong restaurant name: Long Horn instead of Lone Star! Fortunately, everyone figured it out, and we had a very large crowd for dinner with the Fleet Admiral.

When we returned, Danny Potts started up a game of Who Wants to be a Latinumaire, and the 2001 Summit hosts set up their hospitality suite for next year. They covered the hotel bar with food and drink, and kept it that way all weekend, much to the delight of the attendees! At 9:30, twenty people gathered to take part in the Great Dalmuti tournament. We split up into three tables, and fought a first round to eliminate eight players, a second round of two tables to eliminate the pool to six, and a final championship round. I was eliminated in the second round, and went to bed at about 1:30 a.m., looking forward to five hours sleep before the next mornings activities.

Arising early the next morning, I joined a crowd in the breakfast room. Most of those present were Starfleet folks, but there were a few regular hotel patrons eating there also, and it was fun to see them trying to not be obvious about staring at the various aliens and uniforms in the room! After that relaxed breakfast, the business of the day kicked in and I hardly had a moment to pause for thirty-six hours!

I proceeded from there to Opening Ceremonies. At a long table sat myself, VRC Jennifer Rosbury, Summit Chairman Danny Potts, IC 2000 Chairman Cindi Dimidio, Fleet Admiral Mike Smith, Region 2 Marine OIC John Adcock, Chief of Summit Mike Henigan, and Marine Commandant Brian Davis. After that completed, the panels began. I attended the Captain's Call, where all R2 Commanding Officers or their representatives sat with us in a Question and Answer session. He was a fascinating and funny speaker, and had lots of inside information and secrets about Paramount to tell,

The rest of the afternoon was taken up by the annual Summit Auction, where almost 200 items donated by Region 2 members, or purchased with Region 2 money, were auctioned off to support the region's expenses for another year, to allow us to make a donation to a Starfleet Academy scholarship, and to give up capital to purchase Region 2 items for our quartermaster's office. It was very successful, bringing in more than \$2000

for the region's treasury. We had already purchased polo shirts with the Region 2 logo embroidered on them, and they were selling fast in the Store. I purchased a couple of items, and was outbid on a few more, but mostly I watched happily as item after item was bought – because everything that was left was going home with me for a year!

Every year we schedule putt-putt and go-cart competitions, and about every other year they are rained out. This year proved to be a rained out year, so we let the auction run a little long, then spent a little time in casual relaxation. The next big event would be the banquet, one of the high points of the summit each year. Everyone attends in uniform or evening wear, and I can attest that we were a fine looking bunch of Starfleet officers! The dinner was excellent, with choices of two main courses, several sides and several desserts. The only low point was the tea, which tasted more like some sort of lemon-sugar concoction than any tea I've ever had. After the dinner ended, we moved into the main meeting area for the annual awards.

The awards ceremony began with a series of flag rank promotions. This year there had about a dozen promotions to hand out, and it was really exciting to me to be the one up front handing them out and shaking hands for the first time! Region 2 has a lot of deserving officers, and I got to personally reward them for their hard work, devotion to Starfleet and Region 2, and all their contributions that helped make our region the success it is. The awards followed, and if anything, this part was even better. Our awards chairman, Barbara Paul, has developed an excellent program, and the process went off without a hitch. We started off with the little awards, and worked our way up to the big ones at the end – chapter of the year and member of the year. It was such a pleasure to see the happiness on people's faces as they and their chapters won awards, it made me with I could do it more often! One of my favorite moments was near the end, when I presented Barbara Paul with a Superior Performance award for her work on Region 2 Staff – and then took it away, telling her she couldn't have it! The look on her face was priceless, especially when I replaced it with a new award, named after her, in honor of the many years of service she has given the region, and the many times she was nominated for the award this year.

Rich Trulson, Region 2 Chief of Computer Operations and Commanding Officer of the USS Wernher Von Braun, said, "The biggest highlight for me was presenting the Richard Daystrom Cyberspace Award for the first time ever. Even though I was nervous and nearly mispronounced a couple of the winners and categories, everything went very smoothly. I was honored the Awards Director entrusted me with the huge responsibility and honor of judging this award. All the hassles and stress became worthwhile when several of the award winners thanked me later in the night.

Of course, there were several humorous moments that stick out in my memory as well. The best one was when Ron Fell (Starfleet's FDC of recruiting) lost all control of the Auction on Saturday night. Suffice to say, I'll never look at Jar Jar Binks and Spock the same way again thanks to what was revealed and more so to the commentary of those there. I was also brought back to previous R2 Summit shenanigans during the Awards

The awards ceremony was followed by our first-ever Summit Dance, where about half the folks at the summit attended. We had an enthusiastic group on the floor for most of the evening, and an excellent sound system provided by Steve Gordon. Steve played music for hours, with help from Dallas Vinson, and we danced, played games, chatted and played the evening away.

On Sunday morning, we had three hours of panels. The first one for me was the 'Ask the Brass,' where the regional brass (that's the RC and VRC) sit down with the Fleet Admiral and answer questions from people in the region. There was one little problem – no Fleet Admiral! Chief of Operations Les Rickard sat in, and answered a lot of Fleet-level questions, which we really appreciated. I have attended this session every year for five years, and just like the Captain's Call, it has pretty much changed from a 'complaint session' to an 'information session,' thanks to improved management of memberships and other Starfleet materials. The next two hours worth of panels fairly flew by, and finally it was time for closing ceremonies. Most of the same group who did the opening ceremonies was on stage for closing, and we each spoke briefly, thanked everyone for attending, and said goodbye for another year.

Greetings ya'll,

Well, as usual we ended up having our share of Ooops's again this year with the Awards Program. Needless to say we have hopefully resolved the problems encountered along with a few more we've found and hope to have a much better go of this next year. That is if we all aren't deep spaced before hand.

I'd like to say a few things here regarding this program. Stop and look back 5 years to the first Region Summit and the first Awards Presentations.

Now look at things 5 years from then. There's been a lot of changes and improvements made based on the problems encountered over those 5 years.



An Awards Committee has been created to take the program from page one to the last page and scrutinize it page by page to see if it can be worded better to help clear up those vague and hazy areas. We've found sections that leave a lot to speculation and that aren't very clear as to the boundaries from one to another. We're looking at streamlining it for a quicker and smoother turn around time and by going on-line, we hope to help make submissions cheaper and more practical for everyone concerned.

On-line submissions reduce the cost of copying and postage for you folks which with some chapters can and has cost a bundle from the size of the packets we were receiving. Also, with such submissions this reduces the size of the packet so we, the judges don't spend 6 months weeding through a mountain of stuff for judging.

We're aware that there are several chapters who put a whole new twist to the term "Active" chapter. While we understand you want to best represent your chapters work and efforts please try and see this from our perspective. While you have just your chapter to be concerned with, we, the judges have a large number of chapters we have to consider. Like you we too have families, jobs and such that take up our time as well as what we do here in this organization. To take this a step farther, Fleet has almost as many awards as we do in this region to issue Fleet wide but they have that

many awards times all the regions in Fleet to judge and in about the same amount of time as we have here in the region. This is one main reason they went to on-line submissions. To help reduce the volumes of material they had to consider from each region. This helps make judging quicker and easier on them as it does for us in Region 2.

I'd like to challenge you folks who have been complaining about how this program is set up and run. I challenge you to come up with a better program. A program that will be equal and fair for everyone concerned and still meet the Fleet's Awards criteria. Take into account the time of judging the awards, how they will be presented and don't forget to weigh in finances for the chapters too. Some of our chapters aren't very big and don't have a very large operating budget if one at all. Then take each award and figure out the criteria for each eliminating loopholes and blurred and shady areas where things aren't spelled out clearly and as such leaves a lot open for interpretation.

Instead of bitching and complaining about what's wrong with things, help us fix it. Bring your ideas to the table and we'll toss it around. Remember everything has two sides - a problem side and a solution side. If you find a problem, present a solution with it for our consideration.

This program was created for you, the members of this Region. As such you have a definite say in how it's structured, organized and run.
